SENIOR WARDEN Becky Hlebasko, Senior Warden *rhlebasko@bridgehousing.com*

2023 was a year of growth and renewal for our Church. Fifty-one new households joined us this year. Seventy parishioners attended the Parish retreat, we had outstanding attendance at the Welcome Sunday Barbeque, and the Harvest Gala was a stunning success. Almost nine hundred people came to Christmas services, back to pre-pandemic levels! We are blessed to have such a vital community here at St. John's when so many churches are languishing.

Over the past year, Vestry continued the work from 2021 and 2022, supporting and monitoring progress on the areas of focus identified in the Strategic Plan. We saw progress in all areas, thanks to the work of our dedicated staff and the generous donation of time and money by many of our members.

• Both Sunday School and Youth Group attendance increased;

• The **Adult Choir** grew to twenty-one members, and our children's choir, **the Choristers**, more than doubled its ranks;

• We established a **CARES** Team, chaired by Mary Kay Dolejsi. The mission of the Cares Team is to: **Connect** with parishioners in need of a friendly word; **Assist** parishioners in locating services if needed; **Respect** and **Embrace** them – they are appreciated and not forgotten; and **Serve** this mission to strengthen our Church Community;

• **Outreach** in 2023 included St. John's support for the work of Agape Farms in Malawi, The Marin Interfaith Counsel, Street Chaplaincy, St. Dorothy's Rest, St. Vincent de Paul, The Bishop's Ranch and the Marin Organizing Committee.

• **Hybrid Worship** is here to stay - In person attendance has increased since last year, and online attendance remains robust.

The Vestry is responsible for over-seeing the care of our beautiful and welcoming building and grounds. I would like to especially thank last year's junior warden, Joannie Ericson, the very capable chair of the building and grounds committee. Thanks to Joannie, Karen Petterson and others, the project of improving the Memorial Garden has begun and is well underway. If you have not been there in a while, I invite you to go; it is much improved by tree removal and clean up in the entryway, with more to come in 2024. The committee also oversaw a major plumbing project, conversion of the long- unused "bride's room" off the Fireside Room to a Sunday School storage area, and a major reorganization and improvement to our attic storage space.

The Vestry continues the goal of long-term financial stability for St. John's. We came very close to our net fund-raising goal for 2023, thanks to the generosity of our members. However, unanticipated, unavoidable expense increases created an operating deficit that required draws on our reserves. Those reserves are finite, and we will need increased giving to sustain our level of programs over the long

term. To that end, the Vestry has re-established the Stewardship Committee, and you will be hearing from them soon.

Serving on the Vestry has given me a new appreciation for all that St. John's provides, having observed up close all the work and effort that goes into it every day by the clergy, staff, and volunteers. Thank you for the opportunity to serve as Senior Warden and a member of the Vestry. I look forward to seeing what St. John's accomplishes in the years ahead and feel blessed to belong to this wonderful family.

RECTOR

On Pentecost 2023 I celebrated my 20th year as Rector at St. John's. I have grown and changed a lot over 20 years thanks to the understanding and support of the congregation, vestry members and staff. St. John's has changed a lot as well over that time, while keeping the core characteristics that make this such a vibrant church community.

The pandemic created a great amount of uncertainty for churches across the country. 2023 turned out to be our first truly post-pandemic year, and I'm delighted to say it has been a year of growth across the spectrum of the church. Everything from Sunday attendance to the number of people participating in all our programs has gone up since the pandemic. In areas like Sunday attendance we are not back to pre-pandemic numbers but we are defying national trends with growth we are seeing and engagement feels deeper. We have experienced an influx of newcomers which is now surpassing those who have disengaged or left the church following the pandemic. In a promising sign, our in-person attendance at Christmas services in 2023 approached pre-pandemic levels, especially at the 5pm service.

A mentor of mine says that "church growth is an outcome, not a goal." Of course, we want to grow in all areas of church life, but our focus is on living into our mission and vision so that St. John's is a life-giving and caring community for all who come here. When we do our work as a church well we grow as a result.

Just prior to and during the pandemic the vestry worked hard on creating a strategic plan. Naturally, much of that plan was based on responding to the realities of the pandemic. As 2023 has felt like our first post-pandemic year, vestry has been engaged in a process of revising our strategic plan to respond to our new reality and position ourselves to best serve the congregation and our community. In early 2024 the vestry, with staff input, will complete the revision and begin implementation of the strategic plan. Part of the plan is re-creating our CARES team and shifting some of my work so we can best respond to the pastoral needs of our parishioners. It is much easier to visit parishioners in the hospital now than it was during and just after the pandemic which has enhanced our offering of pastoral care.

St. John's is truly blessed with a talented and committed vestry and staff. Working with them is one of the great joys of my ministry. I believe much of our growth and vitality as a church is because our

ministry is grounded in the shared work of the community rather than the person of the rector or focused mainly on the clergy. While I always strive to be a priestly presence in the lives of our parishioners, my main role is empowering the ministry of the congregation and ministries of our members.

In 2023, with the approval of the vestry, I took a four-month sabbatical. This was a crucial opportunity for me to refresh and reset, especially because leading a church through the pandemic was truly exhausting. By the end of my sabbatical I felt recharged and eager to return to this church I love so much. I am so grateful to the vestry, staff and all of you for making this unique opportunity available. Thank you.

On a more practical level, there are three major projects which will be a focus for 2024: Completing our audio/video setup to livestream and record our services including the installation of remote video cameras in the church to expand viewing options, Installation of a new LED lighting system in the church and landscape lighting outside the church (which will help complete our capital campaign projects), and creation of a much more aesthetic access to the Memorial Garden from behind the parish hall and refresh of the garden itself.

Finally, as some of you know, I have served on the Bishop Search and Transition Committee for the election of a new bishop for our diocese. It has been an incredible amount of work, but important work for our church. My role on that committee will conclude with the ordination of the new bishop for our diocese in May. I am truly excited for this new chapter in the life of our diocese — and excited to complete this work. Serving the wider church is part of my commitment as a priest, and the commitment of all clergy, but I feel I've put my time and effort in and really just want to focus 100% on leading St. John's under our new bishop.

May God continue to bless us in the year ahead.

Recently during our Sunday 9am sermon reflection, someone offered the image of a tapestry to describe the ways in which the relationships in our lives support us. This image resonated with me - in the in between moments of my days I've revisited this illustration and the ways in which it feels like what we do here at St. John's, what we do as church. A tapestry is a thick piece of fabric, created by weaving together a variety of different threads that form a design. From a distance it might look like a painting, but upon closer inspection the patterns and pictures are formed from individual threads coming together to create patterns, or a larger image. The parts come together creating something new, something whole, and often something grand. Tapestries are usually robust, and like most works of art, intended to enhance the beauty of our surroundings and invite us to see something new, or something familiar in a new way.

MUSIC

This coming August, I will have been privileged to be Director of Music at St. John's for three years.

The Choristers (our children's choir) grew since this time last year, when there were three members. At the end of December we had eight members, ages 6 through 10. The Choristers now rehearse in two groups to accommodate schedules. We made a lot of progress especially in the fall, and had a very nice presentation for Lessons and Carols in November and the Christmas pageant. We also had a small group sing at the 5 PM Christmas Eve service.

The Adult choir is currently at 21 members. The quality of choral performance has shown tremendous improvement in a relatively short time. The Evensong service in November was well attended and well received, as was Lessons and Carols this past December. We plan to have two Evensongs in the Spring of 2024.

Due to the generosity of the parish, we were able to add one section leader to the choir, a baritone, bringing the total number of paid singers to five.

The instruments at St. John's comprises two pianos, a new set of handbells, and the hybrid pipe/electronic organ. The pianos are in reasonably good shape. The organ functions well enough but may need some minor maintenance in the short term and some major maintenance in the long term. My goal for 2024 is to prepare a full report about the health and long-term needs of the instrument.

YOUTH MINISTRY

I am delighted to share that our St. John's Youth Program continues to thrive, as our incredible St. John's youth help to create a uniquely joyful, insightful, creative, and safe sacred space.

2023 Youth Highlights

- The youth group ran the kitchen for an extremely successful Pancake Breakfast on the Sunday before Lent started – serving fellow parishioners across generations and helping to bring the community together over delicious pancakes, fruit, and <u>lots of bacon!</u>

- Six St. John's confirmands were confirmed at Grace Cathedral in June. The Sunday prior, our confirmands presented their fantastic reflections on the confirmation process to the entire parish during the 10 am service – including two visual pieces of art, two written speeches, and two singing performances.

- We, once again, partnered with Church of the Resurrection, Pleasant Hill for our June youth trip - this time traveling to Navajo Nation in New Mexico and Arizona for cultural immersion and service opportunities. During this amazing trip, our group assembled around 1,000 giveaway bags for Gallup, NM and the surrounding communities through St. Bonadventure Mission, experienced moments of true wonder in Petrified Forest National Park, fully cleared out a cattle grate at Good Shepherd Episcopal Mission, learned from multiple incredible Diné storytellers who blessed our group with their ineffably wise and hopeful tales, explored Bandera Volcano and Ice Cave, and learned so much more about the Diné people, their history, and their land at Window Rock – the seat of Navajo Nation's government. (6 St. John's youth attended)

- With the help of 47 volunteers, we organized and ran a truly awesome Haunted Church on Halloween night – where 1,267 community members (and two dogs!) were in attendance – making this our largest community outreach event of the past few years.

- Confirmation Class has started up once again – now with 9 confirmands and 8 confirmation mentors.

- We held multiple SVDP bagged lunch prep volunteering evenings.

- We offered a range of fun and engaging youth-specific and inter-generational activities at the Parish Retreat in September – including a youth scavenger hunt and youth glow-in-the-dark evening pool party (with 13 youth in attendance).

- We maintained weekly Sunday Morning + Evening Youth Groups – with additional Evening Youth Group parties (such as a Summer Kick-Off Party [complete with jumpy obstacle course] and, most recently, a fantastic Youth Group Christmas Party).

- We, once again, sent out multiple prayer packages, expanding the recipients to college-aged young people as well as youth.

- St. John's Youth organized and ran a fundraiser for St. John's charitable partners Agape Farmhands – making snowflake ornaments to raise money for Agape Farm in Malawi Africa.

Looking forward in 2024, I am so excited for our youth program to continue to grow, as we are looking at around 10-12 youth attending this summer's youth trip to Oahu in June. This will be a combined service + cultural immersion trip, in which we will be working with local non-profits and parishes on an array of service projects, as well as learning from and about the history and culture of Hawai'i and its incredible, resilient Native Peoples. I absolutely cannot wait for coming adventures, new experiences, and even deeper connections.

We are so grateful for the ongoing support of our entire St. John's family - without which our youth program would not be possible. Here's to another year filled with laughter, insight, prayer, and play!

CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

Our Children's Ministry had a wonderful year of fun and engaging events and activities in 2023. Through our Sunday School class, our children not only gained knowledge of the Bible stories, they also had the opportunity to connect with these sacred stories on a deeper level, exploring and understanding faith in a meaningful way. We never skipped a Sunday except on Easter Sunday, Christmas Eve Sunday and New Year's Eve Sunday.

During the summer, the children learned about the heroes and heroines in the Bible and their inspirational example of their trust and reliance in God through their life journey. Our new addition of Godly Play materials was used extensively in the majority of our Sunday school classes. We had three teachers who participated in Godly Play training sessions last year. We hope to expand the number of volunteer teachers participating in the training to further enhance our Sunday School program.

For our activities, the children enjoyed breakfast on Pajama Sundays, hid the *Hallelujah* at the beginning of Lent, had an Easter Egg hunt at the close of Holy Week, planted seeds on Earth Day Sunday, received Back to School blessings, got treats on our holiday parties, and most importantly, took on roles to retell the Christmas story in the Best Christmas Pageant Ever —all contributing to a mix of joyous and memorable experiences. We distributed resources during the Lent Season and gave out mementos during Easter and Christmas Eve services.

Our children had the opportunity to engage in a variety of intergenerational events in St. John's, like the church BBQ, Parish Retreat, Blessing of the Animals, Open House, Harvest Party, and Advent Wreath Making, among others. These experiences foster a sense of community providing our children opportunities to connect, form friendships, express themselves freely, be inspired, have meaningful interactions with adults and overall have a positive sense of purpose within our church community.

Reflecting on the past year, I'm profoundly grateful for the steadfast support of our clergy, staff, vestry, parents, and congregation, as well as the exceptional dedication of our volunteers. Our collective effort has resulted in the achievements of the Children's Ministry, and I look forward to another year of shared commitment in supporting the personal growth and spiritual development of our children in St. John's.

STEWARDSHIP

Summary:

The year was a year of celebration and transition at St. John's: 1) Transition of Church database platforms from Blackbaud to Breeze 2) Fundraised for over half of the year with Rector on sabbatical 3) 10% increase in Annual Fund giving from 250 AF'23 donors 5) 26 LYBUNTS (57k)

6) 18% increase in Harvest giving

With the transition from Blackbaud to Breeze, we increased our accessibility and transparency. During the transition, we used another platform, Panorama, for the start of the Annual Fund '23 - 'Connect to God through Stewardship' campaign. Garnering increased and new support through this platform we moved Annual Fund giving completely from both Blackbaud and Panorama to our new Breeze database. During the transition we saved money through a less expensive platform (Breeze) and increased revenue through support from individuals covering transactional fees.

Starting the year celebrating Rev. Chris' sabbatical through 20 years of service, but without a major fundraiser was, of course, a major challenge. We adapted through increased organization of Annual Fund '23 appeals and process. Also, with the help of several vestry members, we reached each of our members through email, phone, and text conversations in the first month of the campaign. The fifteen week AF23 campaign garnered almost 40% of our Annual Fund goal and with Rev. Chris' return, we were able to reach 96% of our 965k goal.

Our Annual Fund ask of a 10% increase from all givers was met through an increase in giving from 89 of our 250 Annual Fund donors - 36%. We also had 64 donors keep their annual fund giving steady - 26% but had 18%, 46 donors, decrease their giving in 2023.

Another transition included 26 members who gave last year, but not this year (LYBUNTS) for a total loss of 57k in contributions. Additionally, we added 51 new annual fund donors (44k).

The Harvest '23 was the best individual fundraising event ever at St. John's with over 84k in

net income. We increased both the silent and live auctions with almost 20k in income from those events. Also, our generous sponsors increased their support with almost 25k in donations. The Fund-A-Need for children and youth had very strong funding with almost 45k. Overall, we had an 18% increase from last year's Harvest.

Key takeaways from 2023:

- I. Transparency and flexibility leads to greater support.
- II. An aligned staff and vestry keeps the church 'mission focused.'
- III. St. John's flourishes through the people clergy, staff, and volunteers that celebrate our abundance.

Agape Farm: During the summer, St. John's collected school supplies, games, puzzles, and learning aids - filling many suitcases - which were delivered by those who traveled to Malawi. Fr. Francis visited in October to share the work that is happening and hopes for the future, and we sent him back to Malawi with more supplies. Parishioners also made generous monetary contributions.

St. Vincent de Paul Free Dining Room: Over the course of 2023, St. John's gathered during coffee hour and during Youth Group to make lots of peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, providing approximately 400 bagged meals to be distributed through the SVdP Free Dining Room.

MOC: St. John's is one of over twenty institutional members of MOC, the <u>Marin Organizing Committee</u>. Through our work with MOC, St. John's is practicing one of the Episcopal Church's core values and ministries, <u>Social Justice and Advocacy</u>. MOC advocates for local community issues jointly chosen by member institutions. The current issues include Aging & Disability; Affordable Housing; Youth Mental Health, and Homelessness. This past year St. John's was well represented at the Civic Action advocating for a just and equitable wage increase for IHSS (In Home Supportive Services workers), which educated county Supervisors and encouraged them to take concrete steps to improve IHSS wages in the 2024 union negotiations with the county and state.

TransHeartLine: TransHeartLine provides a safe and free space for people to recover from gender affirming surgery. St. John's, along with other faith communities and non-profit organizations in Marin, provides hospitality and meals.

Warm Winter Hats: St. John's provided handmade warm winter hats to help care for the unhoused people living in Marin.

Ritter Community Center: During the month of November, St. John's gathered canned proteins to support the food pantry at Ritter Center in San Raphael.

Holiday Giving Tree: St. John's provided a generous bundle of gift cards to support the mothers and children living at Gilead House and we delivered individually wrapped gifts to the 93 residents living at PineRidge Care Center.

MARIN DEANERY & DIOCESAN CONVENTION DELEGATES Eleanor Prugh, Chair eleanactor77@gmail.com

At the Parish Meeting last January, nine parishioners of St. John's were elected to serve as lay delegates or alternates for 2023. They were Ethan Dettmer, Maggie Doyle, Barry Druschel, Vance Frost, Paul Glover, Connie Granger, Eleanor Prugh, LaTonya Sumner, and Marjorie Sun. They attended five Deanery meetings and two Diocesan Conventions, as assigned by Fr. Chris and their own availability. Five Deanery meetings were held on Zoom, March 1, June 17, September 5 (all Deaneries together on Zoom for a pre-Convention "tutorial" presentation), September 21, and November 20. Finding dates for meetings where most representatives of the Episcopal Churches in Marin can attend remains a perennial challenge.

Of note, this year:

Holy Innocents Episcopal Church in Corte Madera was closed. On April 12, Bishop Marc celebrated a final Eucharist there. It is hoped that the diocese will find a use for the property that will continue to serve the greater church and the community. This work has been started.

In September the names of DEANS for the 6 Deaneries of the diocese were announced. Bishop Marc and Executive Council had advanced this change, in hope that a central figure overseeing each deanery would add to better communication and connectivity among the Episcopal churches in each area and stir up some needed vitality. Marin's Dean is the Rev. Kristin Spaulding, of Nativity in Terra Linda.

The Diocesan Convention was held in-person, in Grace Cathedral, on Saturday, October 28. The night before, Session One was held on Zoom. Early the next morning your delegates, Ethan, Maggie, Vance, Connie, Eleanor, LaTonya, and Marjorie, scrambled for a car or ferry to arrive on time, along with clergy, Rev, Chris, Rev. Heather, and Rev. Jim Ward. If you are interested in knowing what occurred at the Convention, access the Diocesan website diocal.org and find the convention tab for a thorough report.

The Deanery has a small fund from which they make modest grants each year, selecting from applications received. At the November meeting the body of representatives voted to use the 2023 funds to support the St. Francis Community Pantry. They received \$3,000 which was needed to round out their budget, adding to other sources they had. The Episcopal church in Novato, although shrinking, is committed to providing this very needed service to their community.

On Saturday, Dec. 2, St. John's delegates again traveled to Grace Cathedral, this trip to elect the next bishop of the Diocese of California. As you know, Fr. Chris spent much time and energy during 2023 as a member of the Search Committee which presented to the diocese three excellent candidates. On the first weekend of November the candidates traveled to all six deaneries, arriving lastly in Marin at Our Savior in Mill Valley. Besides seeing the candidates and hearing their voices "in person" the sessions were online and recorded for reference afterward. VERY HELPFUL. Our delegates, besides clergy, who voted at the election, were Ethan Dettmer, Maggie Doyle, Paul Glover, Connie Granger, Eleanor Prugh, LaTonya Sumner and Marjorie Sun. The Rev. Austin Rios was elected on the second ballot.

Connie Granger serves as treasurer of the Marin Deanery. Vance Frost is a representative from the Deanery on the Executive Council of the Diocese.Ethan Dettmer will be secretary for the Deanery starting this year.

MEN'S GROUP

Mission: The St. John's Men's Group has regularly met in a safe and nurturing environment for spiritual fellowship and community building. The Group offers the men of the Parish a variety of ways to engage and participate according to their interests and schedules.

The traditional Saturday morning breakfast meetings held once a month have resumed, generally held outdoors in the memorial garden, frequently with a featured speaker or other program. A short prayer service is held at each gathering. Average attendance is 10-12 participants that varies throughout the year.

2023 Highlights:

We procured and cooked for the Spring and Fall Parish BBQs at St. John's, serving as many as 150 meals and engaging new members in the parish community.

We have also resumed helping with meals through the Street Chaplaincy program, for individuals who are homeless or otherwise food insecure.

We held our retreat at St. Dorothys Rest since Covid with 14 in attendance, and had a group hike around the area.

We held our Christmas Breakfast Out meeting for the third time at Creekside Pizza and Taproom in San Anselmo. Parishioner and co-owner Pat Townsley hosted a great event and we rolled up our sleeves and cooked pizzas.

Paul Clark & Keith Granger continue joint leadership of the Men's Group. We'll continue to build on the best traditions of the Men's Group by adding new events of interest to the parish as circumstances and our imaginations permit.

Financial: The Men's Group events are self-financing paid for with contributions made by members for the events. Bank accounts are no longer maintained.

INVESTMENT COMMITTEE

Standing Committee on Investments Andrew Biggs

The purpose of this Committee, which was created in August 2002, is to administer and oversee the management of the investment assets of St. John's. The committee members during 2023 were: Andrew Biggs (Chair), Michael O'Brien, Tim McCandless, Gregg Miller, and Charles Hoeveler. Chris Rankin-Williams attends regular meetings, as does Susan Aley as Treasurer. Issa Brandt and Zoe Brizzolara attend as representatives of Commonfund, the investment manager. The committee holds multiple open meetings per year, with an agenda and minutes available for each meeting - all parishioners are welcome to attend.

The Standing Committee on Investments oversees four investment accounts on behalf of St. John's: the unrestricted General Endowment, the Housing Sinking Fund, the Haynes Family Fund and the Memorial Garden Fund. Commonfund, a large and well-known money manager of endowment and foundation assets, manages all the investment assets overseen by the committee. The investment manager selection is evaluated annually, in addition to a review of the investment policy for the general endowment and review of the investment portfolio asset allocation.

The purpose of the St. John's Endowment is perpetually to enhance the fabric, vitality and impact of St. John's Episcopal Church. Each year, the Treasurer may transfer up to 4% of the endowment's trailing value to the church operating fund. The approved 2023 draw from the Endowment Fund, (4% of the rolling 12 quarter average balance) was (\$117,080.00). The treasurer may take up to that amount, as needed, for the operating budget. Any unused draw either remains in the endowment, is transferred to the house sinking fund and/or transferred to the operating reserves account at the discretion of the vestry.

For calendar year 2023, The Endowment Fund returned 18.41%. For comparison the 2023 return on the S&P 500 was 26.29%, the return on the MSCI ACWI Ex-US (a proxy for international equities) was 15.62% and the return on the Barclays Capital U.S. Aggregate Bond Index was 5.53%. Equity and fixed-income returns benefited from the decline in overall interest rates during the back half of the year. The asset class allocation for the Endowment Fund as of 12/31/23 was 72.13% in Equity and 27.87% in Fixed-Income.

The Endowment Fund balance on 1/1/23 was \$2,708,583.80 and the balance ending 12/31/23 was \$3,090,047.06, representing a net increase of \$381,463.26.

The House Sinking Fund balance on 1/1/23 was \$766,633.32 and the balance ending 12/31/23 was \$907,823.66, representing a net increase of \$141,190.34.

The Haynes Family Fund balance on 1/1/23 was \$335,359.40 and the balance ending 12/31/23 was \$382,869.94, representing a net increase of \$47,510.54.

The Memorial Garden Fund balance on 1/1/23 was \$60,529.39 and the balance ending 12/31/23 was \$68,952.76, representing a net increase of \$8,423.37.

The aggregate St. John's portfolio balance on 1/1/23 was \$3,871,105.91 and the balance ending 12/31/23 was \$4,449,693.42, representing a net increase of \$578,587.51.

More detail regarding investment performance is available from the Standing Committee on Investments.

The Standing Committee on Investments had no expenses chargeable to St. John's in 2023.

2023 Financials

The major sources of income for St. John's in 2023 were the Annual Fund (net \$911,129), General Endowment draw (\$117,080) and Building Use (\$109,091). Actual income from Plate and Parish Party were greater than expected in the budget. The budget foresaw using \$88,000 of restricted funds to cover expenses. After applying planned endowment draws and the Harvest Gala Fund-A-Need, \$99,000 of restricted funds were used to balance expenses.

Total expenses exceeded the budgeted amount, driven by high operating expenses. Auditing expenses were the greatest variance to budget as fees for three years of audits hit during 2023 (while only one year had been budgeted). Other line items that were greater than expected were Utilities, Cleaning and Technology.

During 2023, the church borrowed \$200,000 from the Operating Reserve to cover months with low cash balance. This was repaid at the end of the year. The church ended the year with \$55,376 in the Operating Checking account.

2024 Budget

The 2024 budget seeks to cover expenses with regular donations and decrease the use of restricted funds. Major sources of income will be the Annual Fund (\$995,000 stated goal; \$944,255 net of fees and unpaid pledges), General Endowment draw (\$120,342) and Building Use (\$110,000). Expenses for 2023 include a Diocesan-recommended 2.9% cost of living adjustment for staff and increases for Utility, Cleaning and Technology expenditures.
