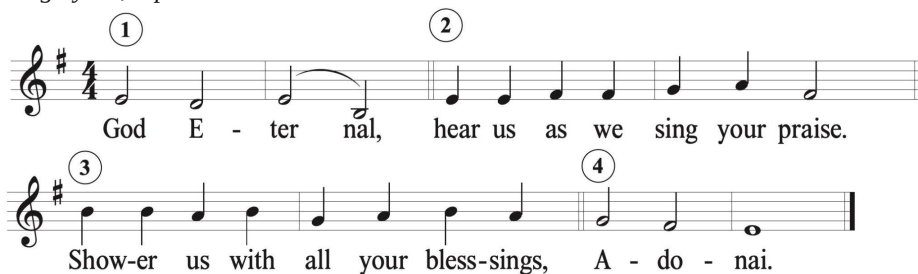

A Reading from the Book of Genesis.

Realizing that their father was dead, Joseph's brothers said, "What if Joseph still bears a grudge against us and pays us back in full for all the wrong that we did to him?" Matthew 18:21-35

Priest The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.
People **Glory to you, Lord Christ.**

Peter came and said to Jesus, “Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?” Jesus said to him, “Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.

“For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions, and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, ‘Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.’ And out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, ‘Pay what you owe.’ Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, ‘Have patience with me, and I will pay you.’ But he refused; then he went and threw him into prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed, and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, ‘You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?’ And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart.”

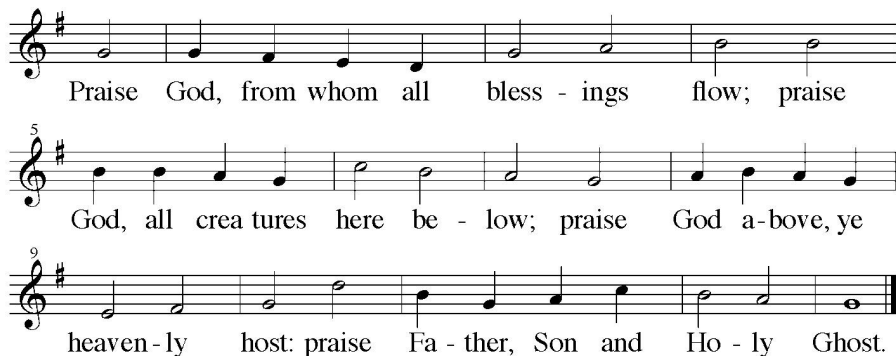

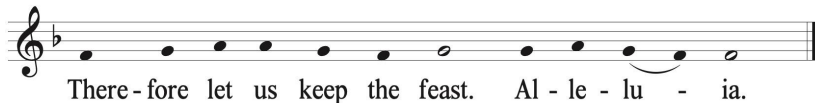

Becoming Beloved Community - Anti-Racism Class and Training: September 20

This class and training is for anyone who would like to deepen their understanding of systemic racism and explore how we, as a people of faith, may work together to build beloved community. There are six modules (though we will only meet together four times - there will be a bit of home learning). Each module includes a video “talk” and questions for reflection and discussion. This course fulfills our diocesan anti-racism training requirement for Convention Delegates, Deanery Delegates, and Vestry members. It may also be done individually. Please let Rev. The in person class meets on Sundays at 11:30am in the Youth Room on September 20, October 11, and October 18.

MOC Forum: September 20 All are invited to attend a forum hosted by the Marin Organizing Committee (MOC) and St. John's on Sunday, September 20 after the 10am service. The forum focuses on issues impacting Marin's immigrant residents, particularly the increasing activity by ICE in the Bay Area, and the looming termination of Temporary Protected Status for almost 80,000 Californians. Music Notes John Karl Hirten is away this weekend. We are grateful for the talents of Cheryl Ziedrich as she subs for him as organist and choir director today.

"Gracious Spirit, Dwell with Me" is based on the old melody *Adoro te devote*, which was originally found in a Parisian processional book dating to 1697, although it could be much older than that. K. Lee Scott is a much published composer of mostly church music and has served on the faculty of the University of Alabama.

The text "No saint on earth lives life to self alone" was originally written in Dutch by J. W. Schulte-Nordholt and later translated by Norman Kansfield. He also wrote a third stanza for this hymn which is not being used. Orlando Gibbons was born into a musical family, his father being a "waite," (an official town musician), as well as his three brothers. Little is known about where he studied early on, but he eventually became a "Gentleman of the Chapel Royal," a position that involved singing in the choir for the king. He made his reputation as a composer of music for the *virginal* (a type of harpsichord) and madrigals. He is known more today for his church music. The tune heard at Communion at this week's service was originally intended for use with Thomas Sternhold's metrical setting of the first psalm, hence the title, *Psalms 1*.
